Introduction



The government wants to improve support for children and young people with SEND.



SEND means Special Educational Needs and Disabilities.

These changes will affect:



- children and young people
- parents
- nurseries, schools and colleges
- councils and other organisations





We must listen to people to make sure we get the changes right.



Children, young people, parents and organisations have important things to say.



We have already listened to people's experiences at 100 events.



This is all part of our **national conversation** about SEND. This document tells you how to get involved.

White Paper



The things people say are helping the government to write a **White Paper** about SEND.

A **White Paper** is a long document about the changes we want to make.

It will be ready in 2026.



People can read the White Paper, then tell us what they think.

This is called a **consultation**.

SEND Support



Children and young people with SEND sometimes need extra **support** in school or college.

Support can mean things like:



- a timetable with large print and pictures
- being able to work on a laptop
- working in small groups
- help from a teaching assistant
- extra time to finish work



Support is different for every child or young person.



Our plans

We want to make SEND support better. We will:



- listen to people who have experience of SEND support



- help people to trust us, and to know that we want to help



- make sure that children and young people get the support they need



- help every child and young person to achieve the things they want to

We want SEND support to be:



1) Early

Children get help as soon as possible.



2) Local

Children learn close to home.



3) Fair

Every child gets the support they need.



4) Effective

Changes make a real difference.



5) Shared

Everyone works well together.

Early

Children should get support as soon as they need it.



Imagine a child is struggling to learn at school:

- How can we find out why they are struggling?



- How can help them more quickly?

- The help they need will change as they get older.

Local

Children should learn in schools and colleges close to their homes.



Special schools will still be there for children with the most **complex needs**.



Children with **complex needs** need more support than a mainstream school can give them.



How can we help children and young people to learn closer to home?



What do you think about **SEND Hubs** and **Centres of Excellence**?



A **SEND Hub** is like a support centre in a school.



It helps children and young people with SEND to get the extra help they need, to:

- learn
- take part in school life
- feel included

Fair

Every school should be able to help most children. Parents should not have to fight for support.



How can we make sure that children and young people get the support they need?



What support do families need?

For example:

- good information
- help to speak up for their child
- support with meetings and forms

Effective

Help children in ways that we know will work well.



Do teachers and other staff need more training about SEND?

How can we help SENCOs?

A SENCO is a teacher who organises children and young people's support.



How can we help schools and colleges to make good decisions about SEND support?

Schools, health services, and families should work together as a team.



How can organisations work together in better ways?

For example, schools, colleges, doctors and councils.



Becoming an adult: how should schools, colleges and workplaces help children as they get older?
